

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT AND CEO

In 2024 Mid-America Transplant marked its 50th anniversary of leading the mission to save lives through organ and tissue donation. Thanks to the inspiring and selfless decisions of donor heroes and their families, 317 organ donors and 2,632 tissue donors provided 891 lifesaving organs for transplant and gave more than 197,000 individuals improved quality of life through tissue transplants.



Over the years, our innovation has soared, allowing us to enhance the quality of life of even more people on the waiting list. By enabling families to opt for donation upon a declaration of circulatory death (DCD)—when the heart stops beating, rather than only upon brain death—we have significantly expanded the pool of potential organ donors. Today, DCD donors represent half of all organ donors at Mid-America Transplant. Additionally, the implementation of normothermic regional perfusion (NRP), which circulates blood through organs before recovery, has markedly enhanced both the quantity and quality of livers and kidneys available for transplant.

Mid-America Transplant marked other noteworthy milestones in 2024. We welcomed the 500th transplant recipient at our Family House and hosted 129 residents—along with their families and caregivers—with an average stay of 56 days. In addition, we facilitated a successful liver transplant from a 98-year-old man, making him the oldest organ donor in U.S. history.

These milestones were only made possible by the dedication of our staff, partners, and the generous families who support our mission. We will continue to lead the charge in saving lives through excellence in organ and tissue donation Until No One Is Waiting.





Honoring a Legacy

After a long life of heroic service to his country and community, Mr. Orville Duane Allen and his family made one final act of service—choosing organ donation. At 98 years old, Mr. Allen became the oldest organ donor ever in the United States through his gift of a liver.

"Our dad was beloved by his family, his students, and the soldiers he led because he was such a caring man who brought out the best in others," said Linda Mitchelle, Mr. Allen's daughter.






A lifelong resident of southeast Missouri, Mr. Allen was a veteran of both World War II and the Korean War. He served for 27 years in the U.S. Army Reserve and devoted nearly four decades to teaching vocational agriculture to generations of high school students.

Thanks to his family's decision to donate, Mr. Allen's liver saved the life of a 72-year-old woman following a successful transplant in May 2024. It is an honor and privilege to be part of his legacy.





National Donate Life Month

Our staff recognized April as National Donate Life Month (NDLM) with a kick-off ceremony at our location in St. Louis.

Purple pinwheels adorned the lawn surrounding the Donor Memorial, each representing the 2,998 donor heroes and families who said yes to organ, eye, and tissue donation in 2023.

Staff gathered across multiple shifts to honor these heroes. The display remained in place for the first week of NDLM and was visited by many donor families and recipients as well as local passersby.

Through the support of our community, volunteers, staff, and partners, April was filled with many remarkable moments of celebration and remembrance.

Dedicated to Our Community



A new memorial honoring organ, eye, and tissue donors shines a light on the campus of Southeast Missouri State University.

During National Donate Life Month, we had the privilege of honoring donor heroes and their families through our partnership with Southeast Missouri State University (SEMO).

A new sculpture designed by artist Don Wiegand was dedicated on SEMO's River Campus Terraces to honor the selfless gifts of local organ, eye, and tissue donors. This sculpture aligns with other memorials in St. Louis and Jonesboro, Arkansas.

Approximately 200 family members, along with Mid-America Transplant and SEMO staff, attended the dedication.

In collaboration with SEMO Athletics, the annual Donate Life baseball and softball games raised awareness for the importance of organ, eye, and tissue donation. The Redhawks wore green and blue in recognition of Donate Life Month, and first pitches were thrown by donor families and Mid-America Transplant staff.

We thank SEMO for their steadfast support and continued partnership.

Jay, a lung recipient from Springfield, Missouri, had fought lung issues for over 20 years by the time he received the call for transplant. Now, grateful for this gift from his donor, he looks forward to playing golf, going to the beach, and giving piggyback rides to his granddaughter for the first time in her life.

Our first Family House location welcomed 262 families between December 2013 and May 2022. Since opening the current location in June 2022, the new Family House has been home to more than 250 patients, bringing the total number of families served to over 500.

A Legacy of Giving


With his active lifestyle and demanding job as a police officer, Rodney struggled to accept that his heart was failing. A few years after his initial diagnosis, he returned home after a long shift and woke up on the floor surrounded by paramedics. He was placed on the transplant list with only three months to live without a lifesaving gift.

The call for a transplant came in August 2020. Supported by friends, family, and coworkers, Rodney recovered quickly, and he cherishes the gift of life granted to him by his donor hero.

"But that wasn't the hard part," he says.

In 2023, Rodney received a call that his son had been in an accident and would not survive. Jaydon had been a strong supporter of organ and tissue donation since his father's transplant and never went anywhere without his green Donate Life bracelet. Jaydon's wishes were clear.




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LIVING DONOR

SEMO Honors Donor Hero at Annual Soccer Game

In partnership with Mid-America Transplant, Southeast Missouri State University (SEMO) hosted the Meg Herndon Memorial Donate Life Game in September. This annual event honors former Redhawk Meg Herndon, who saved and healed 17 people when she became a donor hero in 2012.

During the game, Meg's mother presented a check to the Meg Herndon Scholarship Fund, and SEMO opened the event with a moment of silence in her memory.

After her passing, Meg's number 2 jersey was retired. Her legacy continues to inspire through SEMO's soccer program and the phrase she lived by: "Impossible Is Nothing."
